

Can I Vote In Missouri With A Felony Conviction?

Yes! You CAN vote if:

You have completed your term of incarceration

You have completed your probation and parole

You have never been convicted of an elections offense, either a felony or misdemeanor

In fact, up to an estimated 18 million Americans with past convictions are eligible to register and vote RIGHT NOW. Though, many are unaware of their rights restoration because of felony disenfranchisement laws.

You may not vote if you are currently imprisoned or are still serving probation or parole.

Can I vote if I have been convicted of a misdemeanor?

If convicted of a misdemeanor, you only lose the right to vote while incarcerated.

To be qualified to register to vote, you must be:

- A citizen of the United States
- A resident of the State of Missouri
- Be 17 ½ to register (must turn 18 by Election Day)

How do I restore my rights after serving my sentence or completing probation or parole?

- Upon completion of your sentence and probation or parole, you are eligible to vote in elections. Your rights are automatically restored after you have completed your term of incarceration and probation or parole. However, you must still register to vote after your rights have been restored.

NOTE: You do not need any special documentation to register or re-register to vote after completing your sentence. You Must Register by Feb 3, 2021.

What if I am in transitional housing or my ID doesn't have the same address as my current residence?

- Local election authorities will consider wherever you are physically living and able to receive mail as your place of living. If that is a shelter, you may use that address if the shelter will accept mail on your behalf. Some counties may allow a variety of addresses to be used to register and to assign a polling place.
- You will be asked to show an ID. Acceptable forms include a driver's license, state-issued ID, US Passport, or military ID. If your physical address is not the same as your ID, you can use a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government check or other government document that contains your name and address.
